Could we confer degrees or titles like the one my grandson received: Excellent Encourager? Or perhaps we recognize those who write our newsletters, the Persistent Punctuators? And fundamentally we value *transformational* education, as the Brief Statement of Faith says: 'The Spirit gives us courage . . . to witness to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in church and culture, to hear the voices of people long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace.'"

Today, Dr. Cindy Gnadinger serves as Chair of the Board of APCU, as well as President of Carroll University, a Presbyterian university in Waukesha. Along with Rev. Elizabeth McCord (chaplain and director of spiritual life), Carroll is merging informational, vocational, and transformational learning. Our ecumenical campus ministry at the University of Wisconsin (Milwaukee), under the direction of Aaron Shoppa, is striving to do the same in a secular context.
